From the Desk of the Executive Director

The legislature has hit the halfway mark of the 2023 session, or "cross-over," when bills need to clear committees to get taken up in the other body (House or Senate). There has been some progress on major issues, both in Montpelier and here in Addison County, that should help advance economic and community development.

Childcare: S.56 has passed through three Senate Committees and the full Senate. The Senate version includes costs of \$90 million in year one and \$190 million starting in year two. The Senate's funding mechanism is a payroll tax of 0.42% this year and roughly 1% in subsequent years. The payroll tax is split between the employer (75%) and the employee (25%) with an option for the employer to pay the full tax. The Senate also repealed the Child Tax Credit passed just last year to help defray the cost of the bill. In short, the bill:

- Seeks to increase the wages of childcare workers,
- Raises \$190 million from a payroll tax, repurposing the VT Child Tax Credit, and utilizing some ongoing budget surplus,
- Increases subsidies to Vermont households utilizing childcare so that they do not feel the impact of those increases in childcare wages,

The Senate Childcare bill also includes a parental leave proposal that provides 12 weeks of paid parental leave. The House has its own Paid Family Leave bill, H.66, which passed the House on March 24.

The Senate childcare bill heads for major scrutiny by the House, where it is expected that members will abandon the payroll tax, possibly for a consumption tax or, according to rumors, a corporate tax.

Meanwhile, back here is Addison County, several childcare projects are advancing that will provide much needed slots in the near future, including the expansion of the Otter Creek Child Care Center, a potential childcare operation at the Congregational Church of Middlebury called the Red Clover Children's Center, and a Bristol project planned by the Willowell Foundation that received Vermont Community Revitalization and Recovery Program funding.

Housing: The Senate also passed S.100 – The HOME bill - after substantial negotiation between the Senate Committees on Economic Development/Housing and Natural Resources. Many housing advocates, who also support responsible development where we have planned for growth, were frustrated with what had been done to the changes to Act 250 in the original bill, scaling them back to a superfluous scale. The original bill would have created a 25-units of housing trigger for the entire state, the Senate Natural Resources Committee restricted that trigger to only in "designated areas," which represent about 0.3% of the state. S. 100 now goes to the House.

Here in Addison County, steps were taken towards the major housing development planned by Summit Properties. The State of Vermont designated the area that includes the project location as a Neighborhood Development Area, the project was awarded \$6 million from the VHFA Missing Middle program, and the Middlebury DRB has started review of the project plans. Additionally, a housing development planned for Vergennes by the Sienna Construction Company was awarded \$500,000 in funding from the Vermont Community Revitalization and Recovery Program.

Broadband: H.145, the FY23 budget adjustment bill, which became law on March 20, included \$30 million in additional funding for the Vermont Community Broadband Board, providing a state match to the \$84 million Federal National Telecommunications and Information Broadband grant to Vermont. Locally, Maple Broadband, the Communications Union District for Addison County has been awarded about \$17 million in grants and has partnered with Waitsfield and Champlain Valley Telecomm to start building out fiber-optic broadband in some rural parts of Addison County. Workforce Development: H.484, a workforce and economic development bill passed out of House Commerce includes over \$41 million for workforce training and education, including \$1.25 million for the Regional Development Corporations to continue a very successful Small Business Technical Assistance program started during COVID and a \$5 million Rural Industry Development Fund that will assist RDCs to pre-permit and develop infrastructure for empty facilities and land so that growing or recruited companies do not have to wait 18-24 months for a place to grow or locate.

As these bills make there way through the House and Senate, our message has been for legislators to keep an eye on the overall cost and the burden placed on businesses. While we all support the overall goals of these bills, when added to the tax and fee burden of other proposals such as Universal School Meals and DMV changes, the cost to business could be substantial.

48 Hours in Addison County Marketing Campaign Wraps Up

Hours in Addison County



The Addison County Marketing Partnership, made up of ACEDC, the Addison County Chamber of Commerce, Better Middlebury Partnership, Vergennes Partnership, and Bristol Core, recently wrapped up a three-season tourism marketing campaign called 48 Hours in Addison County. The effort, funded in part by a Vermont Department of Tourism and Marketing grant administered by ACEDC, highlighted over 100 Addison County businesses in three visitor groups: Foodie, Charm, and Recreation. The campaign was targeted to the Boston, NYC, Albany, and Montreal drive markets and featured amplification of our region by several BIPOC and LGBTQ+ influencers for whom we arranged lodging and local bucks so they could experience our region and share with their followers. Summit Properties Awarded \$6M to Build New Housing in Middlebury



The Vermont Housing Finance Agency (VHFA) awarded Summit Properties \$6,075,405 to build "workforce housing" as part of the Stonecrop Meadows housing project in Middlebury.

When complete, Stonecrop Meadows will include about 200 mixed-income homes, offering a combination of rental and for-sale properties. The VHFA award will help with construction of around 35 units with estimated sales prices from \$291,000 for a two-bedroom home to \$336,000 for a three-bedroom home.

The Stonecrop Meadows project received the largest award from the Missing Middle-Income Homeownership program money for this year. If all goes well, construction could begin as soon as Fall 2023 or Spring 2024.

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Four Addison County CRRP projects funded, including for housing and childcare

Governor Phil Scott and Agency of Commerce and Community Development (ACCD) announced the first round of approved grant applications for projects that spur economic recovery through the Community Recovery and Revitalization Program (CRRP). The program, administered by the Department of Economic Development (DED), aims to strengthen communities across the state by reversing the harm caused by the COVID-19 pandemic through assistance with capital investments that will help businesses, nonprofits, and municipalities to recover, retain existing jobs, and grow the economy.



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Green Mountain Job & Retention Program Launched



The State of Vermont, in collaboration with the University of Vermont (UVM) and the Vermont Student Assistance Corporation (VSAC), is offering a loan repayment program to incentivize and retain new graduates from Vermont state colleges and universities. Any graduate during the spring 2023 academic year with a Bachelor of Science and/or Bachelor of Arts can apply for the award.

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State Board Designates Downtown Hardwick and Middlebury Neighborhoods for New Benefits



The Department of Housing and Community Development's (DHCD) Downtown Development Board has announced two new state designations for communities in Addison and Caledonia counties. State designations incentivize housing, business, and public infrastructure development in Vermont's civic centers and development-ready areas.

Vermont's state designation programs work together to provide incentives, align policies, and give communities the technical assistance needed to encourage new development and redevelopment in Vermont's compact, designated areas.

The town of Middlebury was granted the Neighborhood Development Area Designation (NDA). This program encourages municipalities and developers to plan for new development within walking distance of its existing designated downtown.

Haymaker Bun Company was named a semifinalist for the prestigious James Beard Award for Outstanding Bakery - congratulations! The category is new to the awards this year, and Haymaker is among 20 semifinalists nationwide.

Vermont Small Businesses Economic Outlook Survey Results Released



Over 100 Vermont businesses from diverse industries completed the 2023 annual economic survey in January regarding the outlook of Vermont's small- to medium-sized businesses. 80% of the business owners who responded have fewer than 25 employees. The survey, presented by Davis and Hodgdon CPAs and the Vermont Chamber of Commerce, revealed that there is more optimism in business owners' attitudes about the Vermont

economy than there is optimism for the U.S. economy. Also noteworthy is that most business owners are optimistic about their operations and profitability in 2023 and many have made significant adjustments to their business models to adapt to post-pandemic life.

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Business Resources

SBA Executive Entrepreneurship Training Class

The Small Business Administration is accepting applications for T.H.R.I.V.E., a free executive entrepreneurship training course scheduled to begin in June.

Over six months, small business owners will learn how to accelerate growth through targeted training from leaders in small business development and work with a network of experienced subject matter experts in core business areas such as accounting, business strategy, marketing and human resources.

The SBA Vermont District Office will select 20 small businesses to participate in the training course. The training is not for start-ups or people who are thinking about starting a business. To be accepted, small business owners must:

- Have annual revenues of at least \$250,000. - Have been in business for at least three years.

- Have at least one employee, other than self.

Vermont Law & Graduate School's Entrepreneurial Legal Laboratory



Vermont Law and Graduate School's Entrepreneurial Legal Laboratory (VLSell) helps Vermont's small businesses find legal support to launch, transition, and grow. As part of the Small Business Administration's Community Navigator Pilot Program (CNPP), VLSell received grant funding to provide education and legal services to Vermont small businesses owned by traditionally disadvantaged individuals - BIPOC, LGBTQ+, disabled, veteran, rural, and women. Since the program launched in December 2021, VLSELL has helped over 60 Vermont small businesses learn about the law, and find a lawyer to help them with their legal needs.

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NBRC Catalyst Program

The Northern Border Regional Commission (NBRC) has opened the 2023 Catalyst Program grant application opportunity. The competitive Catalyst Program makes up to \$44 million in grant funds available, approximately \$11 million in Vermont, to stimulate economic growth and inspire partnerships that improve rural economic vitality across the fourstate NBRC region.



NBRC applicants must select a local organization to assist with the administration of NBRC grants. In Addison County, you can choose between ACEDC and ACRPC. Applicants can also choose to selfadminister, but must prove in-house capacity and request a waiver when your apply.

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Enhanced Rebates for Commercial LED Lighting **Projects**



In partnership with Vermont's Regional Development Corporations, Efficiency Vermont is offering enhanced rebates to support Vermont businesses in upgrading to qualified LED lighting in 2023. Projects may be eligible to receive one of two special lighting rebates covering a portion of project costs as follows:

- 75% of equipment and installation costs covered, up to a maximum rebate of \$10,000
- Projects with 500 or more linear tube LEDs (TLEDs): 100% of equipment cost covered

This program is designed specifically with small- and medium-sized businesses. However, any business may apply.

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Creative Futures Grant Program

Round 3 of the Creative Futures Grant Program opens May 1, 2023.

The aim of this program is to provide aid to creative sector organizations and businesses that continue to struggle financially due to the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic.


