Since 1989, ACCT has been preserving manufactured housing communities (MHCs) and helping moderate-income buyers to realize their dreams of homeownership through our shared equity grant program. In 2005, we also began developing and managing low- and moderate-income rental apartments with the construction of Stone Hill Apartments at 428 Court St in Middlebury. Our portfolio now includes 354 rental apartments, nine manufactured housing communities with 340 lots for owner-occupied homes, and 75 shared equity single-family homes and condos.

And, that businesses with fewer than 500 employees account for 99.7% of all employers? Over \$8.3 billion would be directly returned to our economy if every family spert just \$10.00 per morth at a local business! This is why ACEDC practices economic gardening: an entrepreneurial approach to economic development that seeks to grow the local economy from within. Its premise is that local entrepreneurs create the companies that bring new wealth and economic growth to a region in the form of jobs, increased revenues, and a vibrant local businesse sector. Economic gardening seeks to locus on growing and nurturing local businesses rather than hunting for 'big game' outside the area.

Addison County Community Trust The Addison County Community Trust (ACCT) is the area's largest provider of permane affordable housing, with over 750 homes serving thousands of county residents. Our mission is to enrich the lives of low- and moderate-income people of Addison County by ensuring the development, management and maintenance of safe, quality, affordable homes and related supports for families, seniors and individuals.

This year, we're thrilled to be opening Firehouse Apartments in Bristol, which will become home to 20 households currently struggling to afford housing in Addison County's extremel tight rental market. Firehouse will help alleviate the housing crunch across the spectrum of needs, from people currently experiencing homelessness and working with John Graham Housing & Services, all the way to households who earn up to 120% of Area Median Income but who still cannot afford to live where they work. We've also been busy upgrading the infrastructure in our manufactured housing communities—like Lindale, where we're in the midst of constructing a brand-new, code compliant, \$4 million community septic system that will serve the 67 homes there for generations to come. Built in the 1980s, Lindale has suffered from a severe lack of wastewater treatment capacity due to 70-year-old septic systems well past the end of the useful lives. Inadequate clean water facilities are a systemic environmental justice issue disproportionately affecting low-income residents of manufactured housing communities across Vermont. Thanks to new state and federal resources, these communities now have access to funding for infrastructure that most of us take for granted.

Looking forward, there is more work to do to alleviate the housing crisis in Addison County and ACCT has big plans to help ensure all our neighbors have access to a safe, decent, affordable place to call home. We at ACCT invite you to join us in celebrating how far we've come while raising awareness about how far we have left to go: on September 15th, we'll gather on the Town Green in Middlebury for Addison Housing Rocks!—a concert featuring The Grift and Moira Smiley to benefit our affordable housing programs. Those of you who are familiar with ACCT may have noticed that we're starting to look a bit different—that's because we're exided to be launching a new name and loop at the event. We are grateful to our Diamond Sponsor, Deppman Law, for making the event possible, and to ACEDC for this opportunity to invite the community more deeply into our work.
